

### **Church News**

On 12 June from 2.30 to 5.00pm, you are all invited to attend an afternoon tea in the churchyard of Holy Trinity to celebrate our 175th birthday. We're hoping for sunshine so that everyone can enjoy their time together, with delicious cakes, biscuits and scones with jam. If it does rain, we will have to postpone the celebration. The Flower Guild will decorate the church with their wonderful and colourful flower arrangements, and we will have displays to show both the history of the church and our current activities.

A few pieces of information on our history.

Holy Trinity was built in 1846 on the Seer Green village green, which belonged to the Rector of Farnham Royal. It cost £1200 to build. We have had 18 vicars, four of whom were women, and we are eagerly waiting for our 19th vicar.

The only changes to the church building took place in the 1950's when the east stained-glass window was installed, a new altar and reredos (the ornamental screen behind the altar) were donated, and the vestry was built onto the side of the church. Coal fired central heating was not installed until 1947.

In 1986 Jordans became part of the parish with Seer Green, and in 2015 the parish became part of a Benefice with Chalfont St Giles.

### **Baptist Church Wildlife Refuge**

If you go down to Seer Green Baptist Church today, you may be in for a big surprise -- not a teddy bear's picnic, but a beautiful mini wildlife refuge.


In 2021, Seer Green Baptist Church gained the A Rocha Eco Church Bronze Award, and as part of their environmental mission, the church has installed a range of wildlife-friendly features.

The area behind the church now includes bird feeders, a nest box, and a birdbath; twigs and brush to provide shelter for insects and hedgehogs; a water butt; and a wildlife pond (safely netted) just waiting for frogs to move in. Marion Cox, the Church's Eco Church champion, points out that both waterbutt and pond were second hand – reducing plastic waste.

A range of grasses, flowering plants and a berry bush cater for birds and pollinators; and Marion is getting the after-school club to help grow and plant lavender and lobelia.

The Church is also building a rockery and would be interested in donations of large stones and natural timber. Come by and have a look!

### June charity of the month

### St Andrew's Church: Family Support Group

This month's charity is St Andrew's Church Family Support Group, a group which supports vulnerable families with pre-school children in High Wycombe. Based in a very mixed area of Wycombe with a lot of social housing and minimal incomes, not all families in the group are on benefits, but those in employment have such low incomes that regular food parcels from the food bank are needed to help feed their families and most families are living with mental health and learning difficulties challenges within the family.

The group meets once a week during term time, and the sessions offer support for the mothers on life skills - parenting, money management, emotional issues, and practical sessions such as planting hanging baskets and making a Christmas table decoration - as well as a chance for some respite, as a creche and lunch are provided. The group helps mothers gain confidence and improve the quality of their own and their children's lives and builds a much-needed support network for these often isolated mothers.

In previous years, the June donation from Holy Trinity has funded a summer holiday trip for the families - a rare treat, as many people cannot afford holidays, so the school holidays can seem endless. The plan this summer is to provide the families with a family day out at Beale Wildlife Park near Reading, including transport so that the whole family can enjoy a day out without the worry of how this will impact their weekly budget. Hopefully, this helps you see why this is a worthy cause for your donations this month!

A huge thank you to those who have given in the past to this charity and letters of thanks from the families can be seen in Holy Trinity.

### Seer Green Gardeners

Once again the Seer Green Gardeners have been busy preparing wild flower patches around the village so that everyone can enjoy a riot of colour at the height of summer, a big "Thank You" to everyone who has helped.

Many hands make light work, so if you would like to lend an occasional hand with any of our activities or events, please get in touch via the website. There is absolutely no obligation, just the chance to join in with us once in a while. Happy gardening!



### Garden suggestions for June

- Frosts are over so it's time to plant out tender annuals and veg, like beans, tomatoes and courgettes.
- When you need to water, a good drench once a week is much better than regular sprinkling. For maximum benefit water directly onto the soil around the plant's roots.
- Slugs are out and about if you use pellets, please make sure they don't contain metaldehyde which is dangerous to all wildlife. Beer traps and hand-picking (add to compost) are excellent alternatives.
- To make flowering broad beans less attractive to blackfly, pinch out the tops. If you get to them before the ants do, they're delicious in salad or steamed briefly like spinach.
- Remove tomato side shoots to get a good air flow through the plant. Limiting the number of flower trusses encourages earlier ripening.
- Add lawn cuttings to the compost bin and mix them in well. You need a balance of soft green and woodier brown material worms love wood chips and cardboard which both work wonders.
- Read Dave Goulson, biology professor and gardener, for advice and inspiration about the benefits of banishing chemicals from your garden shed.

### June 2 - 3 1953 - Coronation Memories

In the afternoon of June 2, 1953, my parents and I left home with sleeping bags and refreshments to catch the London underground to Trafalgar Square.

My father had studied the route of the Coronation procession and had decided that near Trafalgar Square was the best place to be as it was part of the processional route on the way to Westminster Abbey.

We waited for hours all night for the big event; there was great excitement in the air and whenever anything passed by - regardless of what or who it was, a big cheer went up.

In the early hours of the morning of 3 June we heard the news that Edmund Hillary and his sherpa Tenzing Norgay had been the first explorers to reach the summit of Mount Everest on May 29 - that brought a huge cheer (news took much longer to reach us in 1953).

I always recall that sometime later there was a great cry of 'Oh No!!' from a lady standing near me - a pigeon had just anointed her!!

Eventually the time came for the procession and it was raining quite heavily. A cheer went up for every carriage as it passed; all the carriages had closed tops until Queen Salote of Tonga came in an open topped carriage - a huge cheer went up for her and she waved to the crowd with great enthusiasm.

Finally came Her Majesty the Queen looking radiant in her golden coach.

Once all the procession had passed my parents and I caught the underground home where we arrived before the Queen reached Westminster Abbey.

Our television was turned on to watch the Coronation Ceremony, but I was so tired I could not stay awake!!!

### All For One and One for All -The Allotmenteers!

We welcomed some new allotmenteers in May and we wish them much joy in their enterprise. The full moon of May is called the flower moon for the blooms of spring but also referred to as the Hare moon, which conjures up a splendid vision.

We had some theft and vandalism on the site at Easter, which left a pond destroyed and its resident frog dead, but with help and support from fellow allotmenteers the pond was back within a week. The resident frog was given a decent burial and hours after some donated oxygenating weeds were put in another frog had set up home, only to be joined a few days later by a garden frog displaced by necessary work. Although a small pond it is a thriving part of the

natural landscape with constant visits from thirsty bees and many other insects. Birds and other animals water there and within the pond myriad small creatures live. Although the overwintering tadpoles (yes that can happen!) did not survive the vandalism it is hoped some tadpoles will be gifted to the pond so that the extraordinary life cycle of the frog can once again thrill us all.

Alongside the happy restoration of the pond, we have the joy that natural bluebells bring, hidden for years under the chaos at the edge of the site, now they are gloriously visible amongst the thriving hedgerow, the result of much endeavour and now a delight to us allotmenteers.

### Jordans Music Club concerts at the Jubilee Hall



### It's a bird ... it's a plane ... it's ???

Identifying birds by their songs and calls is fun but not always easy; sometimes I nail it, and sometimes it's more like 'What IS that incessant peeping?' One night this year in early May, snug at home, I heard a mystifying call: a rhythmic hooting, more rapid than a muntjac bark; a bit like a Little Owl's squawk, but deeper and on the ground. I popped my head out the window but it was too dark to see, and it stopped before I could record it.

Rather than a bird, it may have been a red fox, *Vulpes vulpes*. Foxes have some 20 different calls; this one wasn't the blood-curdling 'vixen's scream' heard in winter, more like the 'bird-like wow wow wow contact call' and 'wow wow wow (cub/kit)' at the YouTube links below.

Unlike so many countryside species whose numbers diminish yearly, the intelligent, omnivorous fox has adapted to human society. It's abundant throughout mainland UK, and across the northern hemisphere from North America to Asia, and its cheeky survival skills make it a star of world literature, from Native

American tales, to the magic ninetailed fox of Chinese legend, to Chaucer's Reynard and Roald Dahl's Fantastic Mr Fox.

Last autumn a fox often visited the green outside my house; could my mysterious May visitor be one of its young? Fox cubs are born in March, in litters of 3-7, begin to leave the den in April, and gradually learn to hunt and forage under the tutelage of their parents. By July, the adults stop feeding them, and many cubs struggle, starving or falling prey to motor traffic. But by late winter, the 20-30% that survive are ready to find a mate of their own and start the process anew.



### New Plantation at junction of Long Bottom Lane and Potkiln Lane

A few years ago, following a series of serious accidents, a large tree was felled in Chalky Field to improve the line of sight when turning right out of Long Bottom Lane onto Potkiln Lane. This field has now been planted with new trees.

The Society of Friends Yearly Meeting, which owns Chalky Field and Wall Field below it, has explained the situation with woodland planting in these fields (just across the road from the Meeting House), where they have planted major broadleaf trees (Pendunculate Oak, Wild Cherry, Small-leaved Lime, Hornbeam, and Sycamore) and conifers (Douglas, Fir, and Corsican Pine).



The Managing Agent explains that the Chalky Field planting is not a commercial project, and that if it was, these trees would take at least 25 years to be ready for felling, which is a considerable amount of time and, as the new woodland extends ancient woodland, therefore this would not even be possible. The woodland is for the community to enjoy and is registered with the woodland carbon code as a carbon offset for the Religious Society of Friends.

The Religious Society of Friends are looking at this work at a considerable cost for the benefit of the community, as planting and managing woodland is a costly process.

The Local Quaker Meeting has asked the Religious Society of Friends whether they would consider installing a new pedestrian gate on Jordans Lane opposite the Westminster gate into the burial ground, and another gate in the southwestern corner of Wall Field. A quote has been obtained and is currently under consideration by the Yearly Meeting before a decision is taken.

### Great Circle - Maggie Shipstead

Great Circle is an epic tale of adventure, bravery and living life to the extreme. It tells the story of Marian Graves, fictional pilot who vanished in 1950 during a mission to fly around the world, north to south, her twin brother Jamie who becomes a war artist, and to complete the circle, it also tells Hadley's story, an actress self-destructing - whose redemption comes when she gets the part playing Marian in a film about her life.

This is a long novel, which flits between Marian's, Jamie's and Hadley's lives, but it is engaging and beautifully written. The characters draw you in, and it's easy to become invested in them.

I felt it was worth the effort and had a very satisfying ending to boot!

### Sorrow and Bliss - Meg Mason

Sorrow and Bliss follows the ups and frequent downs of Martha Friel, her combustible marriages, family gatherings and her upbringing in a rather bohemian, eccentric home and how this has affected and is affected by her bouts of depression. The author deals with mental health issues with a lightness of touch and humour which is not disrespectful of people who live with these difficulties, but shows how confusing and troubling it can be for the person and their family and at the same time I found myself laughing ruefully along with Martha and her family. Sometimes all you can do is to find the humour at the thin line between sorrow and bliss.



The author has a razor-sharp ability to write candidly astute observations of human nature and family dynamics which is completely spellbinding.

### The Bread the Devil Knead - Lisa Allen-Agostini

There are always challenging divisive reads on the shortlist, and this is definitely one of them. Are you up for the challenge?

What the Women's Prize say about it

"Alethea Lopez is about to turn 40. Fashionable, feisty and fiercely independent, she manages a downtown boutique, but behind closed doors she's covering up bruises from her abusive partner and seeking solace in an affair with her boss. When she witnesses a woman murdered by a jealous lover, the reality of her own future comes a little too close to home. Bringing us her truth in an arresting, unsparing Trinidadian voice, Alethea unravels memories repressed since childhood and begins to understand the person she has become. Her next step is to decide the woman she wants to be"

This is a difficult book to read – relationship rape, family child abuse, violent death all feature repeatedly, but a powerful one and worthy of its place on the list.

I know I'm not really selling it, but amongst the horror, there is hope, some humour and a real sense of friendship and love.

### **Foraging around Seer Green and Jordans**

In May and June Alliaria petiolata also known as Hedge Garlic, Jack by the Hedge, Garlic Mustard, Poor Man's Mustard and Penny Hedge lines the hedgerows and roads in both villages. It is very common and in the picture is growing beside Jordans tennis court



I know it as Jack by the hedge and it has tall erect stems, serrated heart shaped leaves, small four petalled white flowers and the smell of garlic when you crush it. It is very distinctive.

The young first years leaves or smaller leaves from the top of the plant in its second year are best and along with the flowers and flower buds help make an attractive and tasty salad.

The seeds can be used as mustard.

The roots at the end of the second years growth taste like mild horse-radish.

Jack by the hedge is said to be used as a tonic to help asthma, rheumatism and gout. It also has diuretic properties.

### **Elderflower Cordial**

You know the month of June has finally arrived when you smell the strong, sweet fragrance of elderflower. Go out and gather blooms, ideally on an early sunny evening when they are fully pungent. Be sure to know exactly what an elderflower looks like before you pick.

### Ingredients

- · 30 whole elderflower bloom heads
- · 1.25 litres of water
- 1.6kg granulated sugar
- · 3 lemons, quartered
- 50g critic acid (available in granular form from chemists and supermarkets)

#### Method

Gently rinse the elderflower blooms to remove any bugs.

Place the sugar and water in a large saucepan and heat gently until the sugar has dissolved. Then bring to the boil for 5 minutes.

Remove from heat and stir in the quartered lemons, citric acid and elderflower blooms. Cover and leave overnight.



Next day, drain through a fine sieve lined with a paper filter (alternatively use kitchen paper). Then pour into sterilised bottles and store in the fridge.

#### To serve

Add ice to a jug and pour over enough elderflower cordial to your taste and top up with either cold flat or cold fizzy water and add a few slices of lemon.


