


Reading for Lent

I have been reading 'Cries for a Lost Homeland' by Guli Francis-Dehgani; forced to flee her home country of Iran at the age of 14 and now the Bishop of Chelmsford. Her six chapters are based around the words of Jesus from the cross interwoven. with reflections on her own life and experience of loss. I suggest reading this book at a leisurely one chapter per week and if you can share it with a group for some discussion, so much the better. She touches on deep questions of suffering, forgiveness and identity and I have found her perspective has given enabled me to own the words of Jesus in a new way. Canterbury Press £8.99

For group study you might also try the Diocesan course 'Come and See' based around the Lord's Prayer.

Wycombe Women's Aid also has a dedicated children's service which aims to meet the emotional, physical and educational needs of all the children living in the refuge. It provides a safe and supportive environment in which children can play, experience new activities, talk about their experiences of domestic violence, spend time with other children who have had similar

experiences and increase their self-confidence and self-esteem.

Tips for March

- Clean and check garden tools. Chesham's Workaid is a great charitable resource for sustainable buying or disposing of all manner of gardening kit.
- If you grow annuals and/or veggies in containers, it's not necessary to start afresh with new compost each year. Instead just take out the top few inches and spread it around established plants or veg seed beds, then top up with new.
- It's a bit early for most veg sowing outdoors, but not for broad beans and onion sets. Re-use plastic pots, garden centre modules etc to give other crops an early start indoors Somewhere cool is best to stop them growing too fast and becoming leggy.

Unfortunately, the warehouse shelves are looking really empty – the situation has become a lot worse this year with the reduction in Universal Credit and the rising cost of fuel and food.

We now have 5 collection points in the village as the Baptist Church has kindly offered to put one outside the entrance. The others are Best One, rear of 5 Coat Wicks, 46 Orchard Road and Walton House, Manor Crescent.

The most needed items are always Tinned meat, i.e. stewing steak, mince, chicken etc, UHT milk, tinned vegetables and tinned fruit.

I update the list on the Community What's App group for specific items, but those above are always urgently needed.

If you can donate, we can help to make the lives of some families in need slightly better and reduce their worry of how they're going to feed their children.

Getting organised for Easter!

Easter Biscuits

These biscuits are traditionally served at Easter and make a delightful change from chocolate. Although a little old fashioned in taste using mixed spice and currants, they never fail to delight children with animal inspired shapes representing new life.

Ingredients

- 150g butter
- 150g caster sugar
- · 2 egg yolks
- 60ml milk
- 50g currants
- · 350g plain flour
- · 5ml (1 tsp) mixed spice
- Glaze:
- · Egg white
- 30ml (2 Tbsp) caster sugar

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C fan.

In a large mixing bowl, beat the butter and sugar until creamy.

Beat in the egg yolks.

Add the milk and currants.

Sift in the flour together with the mixed spice and mix to form a firm dough.

Knead lightly on a floured surface until smooth.

Roll out to approx. 0.3cm thick and cut into shapes using cutters of your choice.

Place on baking trays and brush with egg white and sprinkle with sugar.

Bake in the oven for 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned.

Cool on a cooling rack.

Eight O'Clock Club - Global Warming talk

Passion, the sharing of knowledge, lively discussion, healthy debate; just a few of the experiences shared during Bob Hall's interactive talk and responses to our own carbon footprint. Heat Pumps, home insulation, electric garden tools, amount of cement in buildings, food, population and transport were some of the issues discussed.



Climate Change was seen as very relevant from the enthusiasm of the topic by those present, especially for younger generations and it's encouraging to know that our own communities are trying to do their bit for the Planet.

It emerged that even ten years ago there was a Low Carbon Group running in Jordans where Climate Change was being discussed.

Sunspots, ocean currents, and active volcanoes can all affect temperature, and it was staggering to hear that the last time CO2 levels reached current levels, was 3 million years ago!

To reach even net-zero emissions by 2050, global emissions need to fall

by 95%. The quick-wins have been achieved, so what happens next, given that the eight warmest years on record actually occurred in the last 8 years! Should we be aiming for absolute-zero rather than net-zero?

Winters are predicted to be up to 30% wetter, and Summers between 1%-6% warmer. Earlier Springs have been reported for some time, as much as a month earlier recently. Evidence of this is seen locally with gardeners highlighting plants flowering at unexpected times.

More intense heatwaves, storms, tropical cyclones, and droughts are also expected, with the richest 10% of the world responsible for approximately 50% of carbon emissions. Something to ponder as we make those daily choices!

Janet's book reviews



Summerwater – Sarah Moss

It's summer, it's Scotland, it's raining unrelentingly, and the story takes place over 24 hours.

This is a short book, just over 200 pages, and yet so much is packed into it. Each chapter highlights a different family or couple staying in one of the wooden lodges. Starting in the early morning rain, the mother who is obsessed with exercise as a way of escaping her family, to an elderly couple venturing into the nearest town, some children playing on the lakeshore, and a young, newly engaged couple trying to simultaneously orgasm, there's not much plot to begin with.

The menacing tension slowly builds, really without you realising why or how. Moss's storytelling and writing style is incredibly captivating, it unexpectedly drew me in.

Summerwater gets under the shifting skin of 21st century British life without seeming to try very hard, then tears it wide open. Probably best not to read it on a grey, rainy day!

Tweet of the Month for March

Blackbird – "Praise for the singing"

One of the most delicious moments of spring is the first Blackbird's song. Throughout winter, Blackbirds (*Turdus merulus*) call or mutter, and first-year males tune up in February. But the real music begins in March, and carries on through summer until all the speckled young are fledged.

Bird 'calls' are used to keep in contact while flying or foraging, to warn of a predator, or create a reaction in other birds. Blackbird's repertoire includes various 'pook' and 'wick wick' alerts; a shrill repeated 'seeee' which warns the young to stay under cover (delivered from a hedge last May in response to my presence); the evening 'chink chink' alarm rumpus; and others.

Bird 'song' is used to establish territory, or in some species, to pair-bond. Songs vary in complexity and may not even be vocal, e.g. the woodpecker's drumming note is its 'song'. Both Blackbird sexes may murmur quiet 'sub-song', but the full song is performed only by the male.

Despite the Beatles, you won't hear 'blackbird singing in the dead of night', but he starts in the pre-dawn darkness, and is pouring his heart out by the time 'morning has broken'. The song is a sequence of freely improvised melodic verses in a rich, flutey voice, each typically ending with a few squeaky notes. Blackbirds extend their musical repertoire over a lifetime, including mimicry of other species, and local dialects develop.

There were 5.1 million resident Blackbird pairs in the UK in 2016: a BTO green-listed species. Numbers are multiplied in winter by Scandinavian birds enjoying our balmier climate.

The Environment

This year, we are running a series of articles on the environment. This month, we look at Ash dieback.

Ash is the second commonest woodland tree in the Chilterns after beech, and probably the commonest in hedges and gardens. Ash regenerated well after the 1987 and 1990 storms. It is fast growing and useful for firewood and timber, and rarely damaged by grey squirrels eating its bark, unlike most other native broadleaved trees.

Sadly, many trees are being affected by ash dieback caused by fungus *Hymenoscyphus fraxineus* (formerly Chalara) spreading via airborne spores. While younger trees usually die, mature trees take longer to affect and can survive: ashes are prolific producers of bunches of seeds ("keys"), so populations may recover - over many years.

Ash dieback came from Europe to England in 2006, and millions of trees are affected. Safety is key: dead branches become brittle and fall; while trees weaken and split and may be affected by other fungi causing the roots and base of the trees to decay and collapse. Hence trees near buildings, roads and overhead wires may have to be felled. Tree surgery has little benefit: ash dieback

frequently kills regrowth, as fungus spores come from toadstools on leaf stalks from last autumn.

Rapid climate changes, the impact of pests and diseases on other tree species and browsing by deer adds to the problem.

We may lose 90% of our ash over the next decade, so woods and landscape are likely to change. However, some may resist this disease, so we need to aid woodland recovery by retaining healthy ash and by planting alternative trees such as small leaved lime, English oak, field maple, walnut and wild cherry.

You need a Forestry Commission licence to fell live ashes, and council permission if the trees are in a Conservation Area or covered by a Tree Preservation Order. Woodland owners can apply for a Plant Health Grant to replant under the Countryside Stewardship Scheme.
