
Church Events I News

New LED Lights at Holy Trinity

As part of achieving the A Rocha Bronze Eco Church award last year. Holy Trinity committed to replace the inefficient older lights in the church with carbon saving LEDs, as it becomes possible. In December we retained local electricians M&R Podbury to replace five lamps in the church ceiling with new LED units, pictured here. This required completely replacing three of the fittings, and took the better part of a day for the electrician and his mate, up a very tall ladder borrowed from St James in Gerrards Cross.

The new LEDs will lower our carbon emissions and reduce our electricity bills, and we hope their longer lifespan will stop anyone having to go up a tall ladder again for quite a while. You may notice that one ceiling lamp, near the door to the vestry, is not functioning. Its old wiring has deteriorated and replacing this is complicated; we are investigating our options.

April charity of the month

Children at Risk Action Network - Safe Spaces Project

Children at Risk Action Network ("CRANE") works to alleviate suffering among the poorest and most vulnerable children in Kampala, Uganda. We have been working with CRANE over the last 6 months with Alison acting as Medical Advisor and Paul as Business Advisor. We have seen the wonderful work that CRANE does and are delighted that it features as one of Holy Trinity's monthly charities.



One of CRANE's initiatives is "Safe Spaces" which provides safe and secure accommodation for children rescued from the streets of Kampala and also for children being questioned as part of the judicial system, ensuring that the questioning is done in a child-friendly environment. Prior to the Safe Spaces initiative, prosecutors (of child abusers) faced numerous challenges when preparing children for court because some of the children would get timid, shut down or simply keep quiet when asked to narrate their ordeals in open spaces with adults, making it very difficult to get any evidence from child witnesses resulting in many cases being lost in court as a result.

Since the start of Safe Spaces, it has become clear that children who are prepared for court in this kind of environment tend to give better evidence in court thus reducing the number of cases lost due to the failure of children to testify.

Please would you give generously to this simple, but far-reaching initiative. Your financial support will pave the way to open up more Safe Spaces and enable the CRANE dedicated team to provide emotional and practical support to the vulnerable children of Kampala. Thank you. To mark her Jubilee year in 2022, HM The Queen has launched a unique tree planting initiative called The Queen's Green Canopy which invites people from across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee".

As well as inviting the planting of new trees, The Queen's Green Canopy will dedicate a network of seventy Ancient Woodlands across the United Kingdom and identify seventy Ancient Trees to celebrate Her Majesty's seventy years of service.

New Benches in Seer Green



The Parish Council have been extremely grateful for the generosity offered for the funding of three new village benches in the village. They will have back and arm rests as requested by residents.

There are two new benches for the Recreation Ground, the one on the footpath route through to Jordans has been funded by Jordans Environment Trust (a local charity supporting projects to enhance Seer Green and Jordans), and the bench near the car park funded by the Buckinghamshire Council Community Board.

A new bench outside the Shops has

been donated by Mr Melvyn Lofty with the following inscription:

"In loving memory of Ernie & Margaret Lofty & the Lofty family bakers and grocers in the village 1904-1992"

Mr Chris Lofty has provided us with a wonderful history of their life in the village as bakers. The full article and photographs can be seen on the History and Photographs page of the Seer Green Parish Council website.

The Lofty family of Seer Green 1904-1992

Milton Cromwell Lofty was born and raised in Chalfont St Giles, and founded Cromwell Bakery in Seer Green in 1904, later becoming Lofty and Sons Ltd. He started his bakery apprenticeship in Whitechapel around 1900, where he met his wife, Martha Berle, who was the daughter of German immigrants who were also Bakers.

In 1904, Milton, Martha and their first child, Berle, relocated to Seer Green and opened the Bakery and shop at the top of Wynnswick Road. They probably chose this location because of the fresh water from the village well opposite.

Milton and Martha lived over the premises and had four more children: Milton Zachariah, Elizabeth, Justina, Ivy and Ernest Cromwell - Milton, Ernie and Ivy would later join the business.

Milton was quite the entrepreneur, the business flourished and expanded over the years and took on more staff for bakery, and to deliver bread and confectionery to the ever-expanding



catchment area, including Jordans, Chalfonts and Gerrards Cross. He also provided housing for some employees.

An additional shop was opened in Chalfont St Giles, managed by Ivy. Milton had his own Cherry orchards, the fruit being used to create the famous Seer Green Cherry Pies.

The coal-fired bread ovens were used by villagers: they left their Sunday joints in the ovens on the way to Chapel and collected them on the way home.

In 1957, Milton Cromwell Lofty passed away and left the business to Milton and Ernest. Milton was eventually bought out of the business, and in the early 60s the advent of mass-produced sliced bread meant the bakery became hard to sustain. Eventually, he sold it and moved to a new shop in Orchard Road where he started a Grocery/Deli. His sons Barry and Chris joined him, opening another shop in Windsor. The business ran successfully until Ernie's death in 1992, when it was sold.

Ernie Lofty was very skilled at his job and his cake icing was a work of art, so he often iced and decorated cakes for village special occasions and created the Harvest Festival Wheatsheaf.

April jobs in the garden

- Sow wildflowers, especially clover, to provide nectar to sustain vital insect pollinators
- Scientists confirm that Spring is arriving ever earlier, but beware late cold spells like we had in 2021 when April frosts were the winter's most savage.

Don't be tempted by early warm spells to buy and put tender plants out (leave the experts in the nursery or garden centre to cosset them for you, so they are in top condition for their transplant).

- If, however, you're looking to plant new trees, shrubs or hardy perennials, don't delay! The sooner you get them bedded in, the stronger they will be by the time summer droughts arrive.

"In early April, especially this cold spring, the hedgerows look misleadingly lifeless, the skeletons of the trees and bushes still without leaves. But much is happening or has happened already." (Excerpt from "A Countrywoman's notes" by Rosemary Verey).

We didn't get through February's storms entirely unscathed here on the allotment site, but no trees came down and hens and bees were thankfully unharmed. So, March will have witnessed repairs, restructuring, cleaning, and tidying up. The full moon in March is called the Worm Moon, heralding the ending of winter as worms come to the surface after wintering underground, doing their wonderful bit in turning and aerating the soil.

Seed potatoes that have been chitting on windowsills or under the bed will be planted into the bottom of trenches already dug. After leaves appear, the stems are earthed up, allowing for potatoes to grow in the dark to be revealed at a later date. Traditionally, potatoes go in on Good Friday, as late frosts can damage or even kill early growth, but rhubarb leaves make a great overnight cover if frosts are forecast and are readily available on the plot at this time!

Greenhouses and propagators will be filling up with seed trays, and we look forward to the first Spring Show for two years on 26 March, a celebration in spring flowers, art, craft and cooking - the village is back!






Our Films in April

The Reader on the 6.27 – Jean-Paul Didierlaurent


This was this month's bookclub book and was a totally unexpected read.

Each day on his way to the plant he reads aloud pages that he has saved from the machine. His fellow passengers have come to eagerly await Guylain's latest discoveries. One day he finds the diaries of Julie. As he reads these he finds himself falling for the mysterious Julie. But can he find the woman behind the words?...

This book celebrates the magic of words and of story-telling. It's a beautiful tale about the love of books and how they can open up new avenues and adventures for readers.


Eliza wants to be a published poet but is told by a publisher that this is not a job for a woman,

Little Hampden and Cadsden



A beautiful undulating walk through woods and along the Chiltern escarpment

Length: 6 miles

Start point: Little Hampden

Difficulty: Moderate



The start point for this walk is the parking area opposite what until 2010 used to be the Rising Sun at Little Hampden Common. From there walk to the end of the road and straight on into the woods. At a road on the left carry straight on and then gradually downhill to a path junction where you join the Ridgeway long distance path by turning left. After another 200 metres down the hill, cross over the road and then through the grounds of Chequers. The house and the estate were gifted to the state by Sir Arthur Lee in 1921 and it is now the country residence of the incumbent Prime Minister.

Follow the path across the grounds and then gently uphill to the edge of the woods where you will bear initially right along the edge of the wood with lovely views over the estate. Shortly after reaching woodland on the right, bear left up the hill across open ground and, ignoring paths to the left and right, stay on the Ridgeway. A short diversion to the right at Chequers Knap takes you to a fine viewpoint then head back to the Ridgeway and follow it down to Lower Cadsden where you turn left onto a road. Take a break at The Plough if desired where David Cameron famously left his daughter behind and also where he entertained President Xi of China! Turn right up the side of the pub and follow the Ridgeway signs uphill to the top of Whiteleaf and its magnificent views out to Oxfordshire and The Cotswolds.

Continue on the level path past the hill top and then turn left along the side of a field on your right. At the end of the field turn left down the hill then right at the path junction. Follow that past Solinger House and at a path crossroads turn left down the hill and then right and cross the main road. The path now runs uphill, skirting Dirtywood Farm, across fields and some woodland eventually arriving back at a path T-junction where you turn right back to the initial parking area.

"What a Load of Rubbish" was the title of Jez Elkins' talk - indeed it is, with 26.5 million tonnes of household waste collected in the UK each year by Local Authorities.

Jez is Awareness and Education Managerfor FCC and knows his refuse from his recycling! The High Heavens Transfer Station at High Wycombe and the Energy from Waste Plant (EfW) at Greatmoor are managed by FCC for Buckinghamshire Council.

Jez introduced us to the Waste Hierarchy as a way of helping us think about what we need, what we have, and how we dispose of it when we've finished with it: reduce, re-use, recycle and compost, recover (i.e. create energy) and disposal. At the first step, "reduce", Jez challenged us to ask from the get-go: do we really need to purchase this item, and what will happen to it once we've used it?

A short video highlighted how technology advances have enabled very sophisticated Material Recovery Facilities to mechanically sort the glass bottles and jars from cans and foil in blue recycling bins. Envelopes with windows need not have the windows removed before placing them in the paper box and you needn't take labels off bottles, tubs and trays before putting them in the recycling bin. If you are unsure about disposal, use the Waste Wizard at https://tinyurl.com/2p8aepbf.

The EfW returns to the Council 75% of the electricity income it generates, re-circulates 90% of the water it boils, and treats the flue gases it produces. Kerbside food collections feed the Electricity and Gas grids and provide fertilizer for farmers. Landfill is almost history.

Easter Craft

Sock Bunny

You Will Need:

- A sock (that odd one hanging around!), from about size 12 to adult
- · 3 Elastic Bands
- Ribbon
- · Felt pen or permanent pen
- · Stick on eyes (or use above)
- About a mug (200/250ml) of rice, lentils etc (small grains)
- Small Craft pompom (optional)
- Scissors
- Fill the sock to about half way with the rice. You can stand it in a glass or plastic beaker to do this with young children.



2. Use an elastic band to tie above where the rice line is.



3. Use another elastic band to tie below this one, making a head.



4. You can also do this for a tail or stick a small craft pompom on.



5. Spread out the sock left above the head and cut off across the heel then down the middle of the sock to the top of the head to create 2 ears. You can trim these to look like floppy ears.



6. Use the pen to draw eyes and nose or use 'stick on' eyes.



7. Tie a ribbon of your choice around the neck.

You can sew on a nose and stitch the ears up if you are doing this with older children.

Tweet of the Month for April

Bucks Council Helping the Endangered Swift.

Last year I profiled a beloved summer migrant, the swift, *Apus apus*. Sadly, in December 2021, the swift moved to Red on the British Trust for Ornithology's UK Birds of Conservation Concern list. One way we can help is to provide nest boxes, as the tumbledown old buildings swifts prefer are now in short supply. I wrote to Bucks County Council asking about their policy on including swift nest bricks in new construction; here is the reply from the Bucks CC Historic and Built Environment Manager:

"Buckinghamshire Council don't have a 'policy' specific to swifts or swift boxes. However, if it is appropriate to recommend swift boxes are included on a building, then this will often be dealt with by a planning condition recommended by the Ecology team. We generally refer to RSPB guidance. Swift boxes are usually integrated into the building

on a northerly aspect/orientation. The boxes should be located high within the gable wall, ideally above 5m high, below the overhang of the verge and barge board.

Our recommendations are usually reactive in relation to an understanding of swifts in the area, either relating to findings in an ecology report, existing environmental records or local knowledge. A more proactive approach to biodiversity in general is becoming established for biodiversity net gain but this does not necessarily deal with individual species. Individual species are still dealt with on a case by case basis.

Swift bricks work well for individual sites, but also at scale, for example, at the Kingsbrooke development on the edge of Aylesbury we are striving for 25% of houses to have swift bricks installed.

For information, there is a British Standard soon to be published. It will be: 'BS42021 Design and installation of integral bird nest boxes – specification' and will follow the concept of the 'universal swift brick"




